A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

It is with pleasure that I share with you the 2017 Lincoln Police Department annual report. Our men and women, both paid and volunteer, work hard to achieve the City's mission – to provide the highest level of service responsive to our community's expectations and to enhance the quality of life and economic vitality.

An explanation regarding a few of the statistics is appropriate:


- Burglaries – While the number of reported burglaries is the lowest in 5 years, it is a little misleading. Prior to Prop 47, shoplifters who entered a business with the intent to commit a theft were often charged with burglary. It is likely that thefts from houses, businesses, and locked vehicle has increased in the past few years.
- Homicide – Lincoln Police investigated two murders in 2017, and while any homicide is tragic, in both of these cases the victim was targeted for a specific reason by a known suspect.
- Rape – There was an increase in the number of rapes that were reported to us in 2017. There was no noticeable trend in these tragic crimes, and more often than not, the suspect was known to the victim. We are hopeful that this is an indication that victims are more likely to report such crimes than they have been in years past.

Lincoln remains a VERY safe place to live and we are grateful for the assistance we receive from the community that helps us keep it that way.

HONORS AND AWARDS

Lincoln Police Department personnel attended the 2017 Placer Law Enforcement Agency (PLEA) Honors and Awards ceremony at Destiny Christian Church in Rocklin on November 2, 2017.

Lincoln Police Officer Wes Collins and Sergeant Matt Alves received Silver Medals of Honor. They responded to a vehicle accident in a field in which the vehicle struck a power pole. The driver was still inside the vehicle and the vehicle was catching on fire.

Officer Collins and Sergeant Alves approached the vehicle and observed an unresponsive driver. By that time the fire was at the driver's door and the vehicle had caught fire. Officer Collins had to jump over 2 downed power lines to get to the vehicle. Sergeant Alves knocked the fire down with a fire extinguisher and Officer Collins broke out the driver's window and pulled the driver out of the vehicle. They carried the driver out of the field and onto the roadway, away from the fire.

Two Lincoln Police Volunteers were recognized for their dedication and for donating thousands of hours of their time - Bob Lapham, over 5,000 hours and John Richardson, over 3,000 hours. Thank you both!



NEW EMPLOYEES

Travis Parson was hired as Police Officer in August, 2107. Officer Parson previously lived in Lincoln but after graduating from the Butte Law Enforcement Training Academy he was hired by the Clearlake Police Department. He spent 4 years working as a patrol officer and K9 handler. While he enjoyed his experiences there, he and his wife want to raise their family in Placer County and he said it feels great to be “home”.



INVESTIGATIONS

The Investigation Unit is comprised two full-time and one part-time Detectives, and they report to the department Administrative/Detective Sergeant. The mission of the Investigations Unit is to identify, target, and arrest individuals involved in criminal activity with a specific emphasis on felony crimes.

Detectives are sent to various schools to receive specialized “Advanced Officer” training. Examples of training include: Criminal Investigations, Interview and Interrogation, Homicide Investigation, Sexual Assault Investigation, Search Warrant preparation, Child Abuse Investigation, and Officer Involved Critical Incident Investigation.

Detectives work closely with patrol officers to identify witnesses, preserve major crime scenes, gather critical investigative Information and develop leads or suspects. They also work closely with officials from allied agencies to solve crimes that cross jurisdictional lines.

In 2017, the Lincoln Police Detectives Unit handled a total of 143 cases, including two murders.

LINCOLN POLICE VOLUNTEERS

In 2017, the Lincoln Police Volunteer Program included 39 Team Members. These volunteers contributed over 10,166 hours serving the Police Department and Community.

Lincoln Police Volunteers contribute their time to assist the Police Department in areas of Patrol, Traffic Control at Lincoln Schools, Customer Service, Front Counter, Fingerprinting, and Special Events. They are trained to assist with personal safety, citizen customer service, CPR and First Aid, radio operations, directing traffic, home and building theft security reviews, and emergency preparedness.

UCR INTRODUCTION & DEFINITIONS

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) is a program by the Federal Bureau of Investigations which established a uniform standard of reporting crime statistics. This program provides a nationwide view of crime trends as reported by city, county, and state law enforcement agencies.

DEFINITIONS – PART ONE CRIMES

Criminal Homicide

The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Rape

Penetration, no matter how slight with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

Robbery

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and or by putting the victim in fear.

Assault

An unlawful attempt, coupled with a present ability to commit a violent injury upon on another person.

UCR DEFINITIONS CONTINUED

Burglary

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

Larceny – Theft

The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.


Vehicle Theft

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Arson

Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another etc .





Crime Rate Per 1,000 residents 2013-2017




PROPERTY CRIME
